




Kentucky Derby Social Event May 6

New Air Conditioner for Clubhouse

The Board members were diligent in asking for multiple bids (Atlas Butler, Classic Air, CJS) and conducting interviews onsite to allow them to provide a quote to replace our original (23-year-old) air conditioner for the clubhouse. The bids ranged from \$5000-\$9000 for different options. The Board selected the vendor Classic Air to install a Tempstar 16 SEER Condenser & Evaporation Coil unit on April 21 at a cost of \$6,634. This comes with a 10-year parts & compressor warranty.



Fence Project Completed in April

The white fencing, which was our CP responsibility to maintain, including horizontal boards and 83 posts, was removed by our Collingwood Pointe volunteers which saved us over \$4500 for this removal effort. The white fencing on Morse Rd is maintained by the Preserve Master Community Association (PMCA). Several individuals helped in pulling off the horizontal boards and stacking those since they were still useable. The posts and vertical boards were rotten in many places. We stacked the posts up and Greg Talbott worked with the Rumpke driver to remove them.

The Board tried to find a contractor that would remove the fencing in exchange for taking the materials that were still useable then disposing of what was not good. All the quotes we received were very high. We switched to a volunteer removal effort, and we thank all the men and women who helped load the good boards that were donated. We were very thankful Rumpke hauled away the pile of posts for no additional cost. The 83 stumps were ground down below ground level and our volunteers filled in those areas.

Virtual Tour of Auschwitz

Join your friends and neighbors for an educational program about the Auschwitz Concentration Camp. On March 31, the Mayor of Gahanna, Laurie Jadwin, posted a notice on the Gahanna.gov website that she was involved in the discussions that resulted in Sheetz executives withdrawing from purchasing the land across the street from us on Morse Road from the New Albany Realty company. She further clarified that suspending all efforts meant that they do not intend to proceed further with locating a gas station across from Collingwood Pointe at the Preserve. The Board has now discontinued all further efforts in this area. Multiple residents have now registered on the Gahanna.gov website at this link to get notice of all Planning Commission Meeting Notices and Agendas so that we can continue to keep an eye on what is happening with the land across from us until we know it is developed. While we will not be dealing with Sheetz, the New Albany Company still wants to push ahead to sell that land that has been vacant for many years and Gahanna city officials still are pushing to get the land developed because it will generate more property taxes to support the Gahanna-Jefferson Schools.

Sadly, Gahanna city officials are still showing signs of proceeding to approve development of land within its city limits that benefits it financially and is not favorable to homeowners nearby. Community Message Board Update

Nearby Construction – Many Trees Gone & Sidewalk Blocked



Yes, the construction for the apartment complex has begun and the first step was cutting down most of the trees that had stood for many years. The project called **Morse Road 14**, consisting of 251 apartments, is being proposed on 13.96 acres at 5503 Morse Road by applicant Scott Harper of Harper Architectural Studio, LLC.

The construction company has also now blocked the walkway on the south side of Morse Rd as inaccessible. If you go around their yellow tape warning, you will encounter a large chunky gravel drive. It cannot be walked over by most of us seniors, cannot bikes over it, and no pushing strollers -- so it is best to just stick to walking on the North side of Morse Rd until this construction ends.



In addition to the construction trucks, we have also had traffic delays and installation of many temporary <u>steel plates</u> being installed in the middle lane of Morse Rd from our community and going west to Hamilton Rd. Some CPP residents checked into this and were told they are installing more fiberoptic cable (used for internet transmission) which is needed to support the bandwidth growth, and it was triggered to be done now due to the apartments being built.

There are also numerous steel plates on Morse Rd between Hamilton Rd and the I-270 entrance. Slow down driving over these steel plates and change lanes to avoid them when you can. Some have been temporarily patched but they are still hard to drive over.



Who's That Living Next Door – Harold Fisher



Harold Fisher has lived at 4680 Collingville Way for a little over 11 years. He is single and in October 2022 was able to retire at age 63 after a very distinguished career working for American Electric Power (AEP) for 45 years and 8 months. The last couple of years, Harold has been assisting Rick Calhoun in maintaining the Collingwood Pointe website. His main function has been updating the website with the latest financial reports, Pointer issues, upcoming social events, etc. He has also volunteered at CWP with building inspections, spraying shutters, spreading insect repellant, raking mulch, and assisted in the recent fence removal project.
